My Dear LSPS Students,

Easter is the most important festival in the Christian calendar. It celebrates God raising his son Jesus from the dead as well as the destruction of the power of sin and death forever. It symbolises the opening of Heaven with the gift of eternal life to everyone.

Ash Wednesday and Lent





Marking the beginning of Lent, Ash Wednesday takes place 46 days before Easter Sunday. During Mass, the priest will apply ashes to the heads of willing participants. A cross drawn in ash is applied upon the forehead, and symbolizes the dust that God made us from. It also represents our willingness to repent for sinning, and the grief we feel for having caused a division from God.

Fast and abstinence is to be observed on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday of each year. Abstinence means giving up of eating meat. Fasting permits the eating of one full meal.

The faithful are exhorted to make a special effort in the practice of works of piety, such as daily Mass, daily visits to the Blessed Sacrament or the Stations of the Cross.

Palm Sunday



Palm Sunday is both the final Sunday or the end of Lent, and the beginning of the Holy Week. The Holy Week commemorates Jesus Christ's arrival in Jerusalem, and the last week of his life on earth.

During the Palm Sunday Mass, parishioners may be handed a palm leaf that they carry into the church. These palms have been blessed and can be made into a cross or other personal devotion to be kept for a year. Otherwise the palms are returned to the church and turned into ash for the following year's Ash Wednesday progressions.

Holy Thursday



Holy Thursday commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, and his institution of the priesthood. Celebrating this meal as a Passover feast, Jesus shared his final meal with his Disciples in Jerusalem.

This was the night that he was betrayed by Judas, and during the meal he rightly predicted this betrayal. His willingness to face his fate, shows that he was willing to sacrifice himself for the benefit of all mankind.

Known as the Mass of the Lord's Supper, Holy Thursday Mass is held in commemoration of Jesus Christ's last supper. The Eucharist is particularly important in this Mass, for it was during this meal that Christ broke bread with his disciples and uttered the words "This is my body, this is my blood" (Mark 14:22-25).

During the feast, Jesus also washed the feet of his 12 apostles, anointing them as his first priests. This humbling gesture is re-enacted during Mass.

Good Friday



Good Friday commemorates the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. It is a day of solemn reflection that is shared by most Christians around the world.

Holy Saturday Night - Easter Vigil



New Members will receive the three sacraments of initiation into the Catholic Church: Baptism, Confirmation and the First Communion. The Mass is held at night.

Easter Sunday



Easter Sunday is the greatest of all Sundays as it is the celebration of the Lord's resurrection from the dead. Culminating in His Ascension to the Father and sending of the Holy Spirit upon the Church, there are 50 days of Easter from the first Sunday to Pentecost

It is heartening to see that all around the world, citizens have been expressing their sincere appreciation and gratitude to those directly battling coronavirus on the front line.

Aside from doing schoolwork, make time for:

- Reading for pleasure as this will support literacy skills
- Developing interest areas where you have wanted to explore something
- Connecting with family and close friends through phone calls, video calls etc.
- Spending quality time with your family by preparing family meals and doing household chores
